SECTION B -- SUPPLIES OR SERVICES AND PRICES

B.1 INSTRUCTION TO BIDDERS

- a. The bid takes into consideration Amendments, called Addendum, to the plans and specifications, the receipt of which is acknowledged in the space provided on the reverse side of the Solicitation, Offer, and Award, Standard Form 1442 (Rev 4-85).

SECTION E -- INSPECTION AND ACCEPTANCE

E.1 52.246-12 INSPECTION OF CONSTRUCTION

AUGUST 1996

- (a) Definition. "Work" includes, but is not limited to, materials, workmanship, and manufacture and fabrication of components.

- (e) The Contractor shall promptly furnish, at no increase in contract price, all facilities, labor, and material reasonably needed for performing such safe and convenient inspections and tests as may be required by the Contracting Officer. The Government may charge to the Contractor any additional cost of inspection or test when work is not ready at the time specified by the Contractor for inspection or test, or when prior rejection makes reinspection or retest necessary. The Government shall perform all inspections and tests in a manner that will not unnecessarily delay the work. Special, full size, and performance tests shall be performed as described in the contract.
- (f) The Contractor shall, without charge, replace or correct work found by the Government not to conform to contract requirements, unless in the public interest the Government consents to accept the work with an appropriate adjustment in contract price. The Contractor shall promptly segregate and remove rejected material from the premises.
- (g) If the Contractor does not promptly replace or correct rejected work, the Government may-
- (1) by contract or otherwise, replace or correct the work and charge the cost to the Contractor; or
- (2) terminate for default the Contractor's right to proceed.
- (h) If, before acceptance of the entire work, the Government decides to examine already completed work by removing it or tearing it out, the Contractor, on request, shall promptly furnish all necessary facilities, labor, and material. If the work is found to be defective or nonconforming in any material respect due to the fault of the Contractor or its subcontractors, the Contractor shall defray the expenses of the examination and of satisfactory reconstruction. (i) Unless otherwise specified in the contract, the Government shall accept, as promptly as practicable after completion and inspection, all work required by the contract or that portion of the work the Contracting Officer determines can be accepted separately. Acceptance shall be final and conclusive except for latent defects, fraud, gross mistakes amounting to fraud, or the Government's rights under any warranty or guarantee.

E.3 52.246-21 WARRANTY OF CONSTRUCTION

MARCH 1994

- (a) In addition to any other warranties in this contract, the Contractor warrants, except as provided in paragraph (i) of this clause, that work performed under this contract conforms to the contract requirements and is free of any defect in equipment, material, or design furnished, or workmanship performed by the Contractor or any subcontractor or supplier at any tier.

cause, including the fault or negligence of the Contractor, or for which an equitable adjustment is provided for or excluded under any other term or condition of this contract.

- (c) A claim under this clause shall not be allowed--
- (1) For any costs incurred more than 20 days before the Contractor shall have notified the Contracting Officer in writing of the act or failure to act involved (but this requirement shall not apply as to a claim resulting from a suspension order); and
- (2) Unless the claim, in an amount stated, is asserted in writing as soon as practicable after the termination of the suspension, delay, or interruption, but not later than the date of final payment under the contract.

F.6 52.246-12 INSPECTION OF CONSTRUCTION

AUGUST 1996

- (a) Definition. "Work" includes, but is not limited to, materials, workmanship, and manufacture and fabrication of components.
- (b) The Contractor shall maintain an adequate inspection system and perform such inspections as will ensure that the work performed under the contract conforms to contract requirements. The Contractor shall maintain complete inspection records and make them available to the Government. All work shall be conducted under the general direction of the Contracting Officer and is subject to Government inspection and test at all places and at all reasonable times before acceptance to ensure strict compliance with the terms of the contract.
- (c) Government inspections and tests are for the sole benefit of the Government and do not--
- (1) Relieve the Contractor of responsibility for providing adequate quality control measures;
- (2) Relieve the Contractor of responsibility for damage to or loss of the material before acceptance;
- (3) Constitute or imply acceptance; or
- (4) Affect the continuing rights of the Government after acceptance of the completed work under paragraph (i) of this section.
- (d) The presence or absence of a Government inspector does not relieve the Contractor from any contract requirement, nor is the inspector authorized to change any term or condition of the specification without the Contracting Officer's written authorization.
- (e) The Contractor shall promptly furnish, at no increase in contract price, all facilities, labor, and material reasonably needed for performing such safe and convenient inspections and tests as may be required by the Contracting Officer. The Government may charge to the Contractor any additional cost of inspection or test when work is not ready at the time specified by the Contractor for inspection or test, or when prior rejection makes reinspection or retest necessary. The Government shall perform all inspections and tests in a manner that will not unnecessarily delay the work. Special, full size, and performance tests shall be performed as described in the contract.
- (f) The Contractor shall, without charge, replace or correct work found by the Government not to conform to contract requirements, unless in the public interest the Government consents to accept the work with an appropriate adjustment in contract price. The Contractor shall promptly segregate and remove rejected material from the premises.
- (g) If the Contractor does not promptly replace or correct rejected work, the Government may--
- (1) by contract or otherwise, replace or correct the work and charge the cost to the Contractor; or
- (2) terminate for default the Contractor's right to proceed.
- (h) If, before acceptance of the entire work, the Government decides to examine already completed work by removing it or tearing it out, the Contractor, on request, shall promptly furnish all necessary facilities, labor, and

material. If the work is found to be defective or nonconforming in any material respect due to the fault of the Contractor or its subcontractors, the Contractor shall defray the expenses of the examination and of satisfactory reconstruction. However, if the work is found to meet contract requirements, the Contracting Officer shall make an equitable adjustment for the additional services involved in the examination and reconstruction, including, if completion of the work was thereby delayed, an extension of time.

(i) Unless otherwise specified in the contract, the Government shall accept, as promptly as practicable after completion and inspection, all work required by the contract or that portion of the work the Contracting Officer determines can be accepted separately. Acceptance shall be final and conclusive except for latent defects, fraud, gross mistakes amounting to fraud, or the Government's rights under any warranty or guarantee.

SECTION H - SPECIAL CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS

H.1 CONSTRUCTION SERVICES

- (a) The Contractor shall provide supervision, labor, materials, equipment, tools, construction equipment, machinery, inspection, testing, start-up, heat, utilities, transportation and other facilities and services necessary for proper execution and completion of the work identified in the contract. The Contractor shall remove any personnel or subcontractors that the Government disapproves.
- (b) Only State-licensed General Contractors that have experience in the work related to the scope of work in the contract shall be allowed to perform the construction, which included or relates to: any Government owned or operated property, facility, structure, land, improvement or appurtenance. This includes Visitor Centers, Maintenance Facilities, Administrative Offices, Water Treat Facilities, Utilities, Roads, Employee Housing, Laboratories, Dams, Levees, Bridges, Hazardous Material Clean-Up. Recreation Structures and other structures deemed critical to the Government mission. The Contractor shall follow the Davis-Bacon Act which established the requirement for paying prevailing wages on public works projects.
- (c) The Contractor shall provide effective security for the work site, staging areas, and materials storage areas.
- (d) The Contractor shall at all times exercise complete and exclusive control over the means, methods, sequences, and techniques of construction. Any time work is being performed have an on-site Project Manager or Project Superintendent who is familiar with the work.
- (e) The Contractor shall schedule and coordinate construction activities so as not to unduly impact ongoing Government operations. Government operations have precedence over the construction activities.
- (f) The Contractor shall have the ultimate responsibility for Health and Safety on the project site at all times, from the issuance of the contract until final completion and acceptance of the project.
- (g) The Contractor is responsible for ensuring that all onsite activities, equipment, and facilities constructed by the Contractor, subcontractor, or supplier conform fully to the standard of the Department Labor, Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) 29 CFR 1926 and 1910: and DOI/BIA polices.

H.2 Requirements for Execution of Surety Bonds

Each surety company bond (performance and payment) which purports to have been executed by an agent or attorney-in-fact, for the corporate surety, is required to have submitted with it a power of attorney to the signatory agent or attorney-in-fact, and executed by the corporate surety upon a date reasonably approximate to the date to the bond. Such power of attorney shall in each instance be retained with the bond.

H.3 Modification Proposal - Cost Breakdown

The Contractor, in connection with any proposal he makes for a contract modification, shall furnish a price breakdown, itemized as required by the Contracting Officer (CO). subcontract, and overhead costs, as well as profit, and shall cover all work involved in the modification, whether such work was deleted, added, or changed. Any amount claimed for subcontractors shall be supported by a similar price breakdown. In addition, if the proposal includes a time extension, a justification thereof shall also be furnished. The proposal, together with the price breakdown and time extension justification, shall be furnished by the date specified by the Contracting Officer.

H.4 Changes

The contractor shall not perform any of contingent sum work, until the Contracting Officer issues a contract modification authorizing performance of work in accordance with FAR Clause 52.243-04, Changes.

The Contractor shall promptly notify the Contracting Officer, in writing, of subsurface or any physical conditions from those indicated in this contract or unknown physical conditions at the site before proceeding with the work.

The change orders request shall be forwarded to the Contracting Officer by memorandum outlining the need and a justification for the change order. Upon receipt of a change order request, the Contracting Officer will request a cost proposal from the Contractor. All cost proposals shall be in detail and itemized, showing price breakdown in sufficient detail to permit an analysis of cost for material, labor, equipment, hours, taxes, insurance, bonds, overhead costs, profit, and complete description of work involved in the change order, including any time extension.

In an emergency situation, a telephone approval may be granted by the Contracting Officer, and immediately the Contractor shall follow through by submitting a written cost proposal to the Contracting Officer. The Contracting Officer will issue a contract modification to authorize the work for the "emergency".

H.5 Contractor Safety Program Requirements

The Contractor shall establish a safety program, which shall include at a minimum the following requirements:

- (a) <u>Safety Program Submittal</u>: Within 10 days following the awarding of a contract, the Contractor shall submit in writing to the Contracting Officer's Representative (COR) a proposed comprehensive safety program for approval. The Contractor's safety program shall detail policies, procedures and plans that will be implemented to ensure the safety and health of employees and visitors at the job site. The Contractor shall prepare a list of major hazards associated with the contract work and provide in the safety program means to minimize the hazards.
- (b) <u>Pre-Construction Safety Meeting</u>: Representative of the Contractor shall meet with Contracting Officer's Representative and CO prior to the start of construction to review the safety program and discuss implementation of health and safety provisions pertinent to the work under contract. The Contractor should be prepared to discuss, in detail, the measures to be taken to control the hazards associated with the major phases of the work under contract. This meeting shall be devoted mainly to a discussion of the manner in which the Contractor intends to administer the health and safety program, delegation of responsibility for implementing the program, and a determination of what shall be presented in the written safety program.

- (c) <u>Contractor Housekeeping Requirement</u>: Good housekeeping, including provision and facilities for routine scrap removal, shall be maintained in all areas within the Contractor's scope of operation. Any and all garbage shall be stored and removed to an approved dump site as specified by the permitting Agency. The construction yard(s) shall be restored to their natural condition or better as required by the permitting requirements and in accordance with Tribal, State, and Federal law (i.e. applicable OSHA construction standards).
- (d) <u>Contractor Contamination Requirement</u>: Handling, storage, and disposal of toxic materials of any nature shall be carried out in a manner so as not to contaminate or pollute public and/or private property, water supplies, rivers, lakes, reservoirs, streams, or the atmosphere. Disposal of all materials, including waste, garbage, and sewage, shall comply with all local, tribal, state, and federal regulations (i.e. Clean Air and Water Acts).

H.6 Hours and Days of Work

- (a) Except in executive, administrative, and supervisory positions, no individual directly employed on the project may be permitted to work more than forty hours in any work week except as outlined below.
- (b) The Contractor shall submit to the Contracting Officer the name and legal address of each foreman to be employed under this contract prior to his entrance on duty. Foremen will not be affected by the forty hour work week provisions stated above so long as their duties are strictly supervisory or administrative, but any foreman working with tools and performing the duties of a journeyman or mechanic or actually engaged in manual labor will be limited by the provisions above notwithstanding that they may work only a portion of the hours as a journeyman or mechanic or at manual labor.
- (c) The performance time allowed under this contract is based on a four day work week, ten hours per day, Monday through Thursday or Tuesday through Friday. Accordingly, construction work requiring inspection by Government personnel generally will not be permitted on Saturdays or Sundays. Also, on those days recognized as legal holidays for Government employees, construction work requiring Government inspection generally will not be permitted.
- (d) In situations which can be justified to the satisfaction of the Contracting Officer and his authorized representative, work in excess of forty hours per week and/or on the above mentioned weekends and holidays may be approved upon a two week written request (with justification) by the Prime Contractor. However, the contract contemplates holding overtime to an absolute minimum and bids should be based on this understanding.

H.7 Determination and Extension of Contract Time

(a) The calendar days, stated under Section F.1 - FAR 52.211-10, allowed for the performance of the contract is based upon the work to be performed and weather conditions that are normally anticipated in the area that may prevent work. The invoice will not be processed until all material certifications and test results are received and approved. In addition, when applicable, all Monthly Construction Reports must be approved and current before payment may be processed.

H.9 Plans and Specifications

- (a) Due to excessive costs incurred by the Government in printing, the Government will no longer be providing plans and specifications for its projects to suppliers and/or subcontractors.
- (b) Any Prime Contractor bidding on Government contracts is responsible for providing its Subcontractors and Suppliers with information relating to their respective disciplines for cost proposals. Any misinterpretation or incorrect bids made to the Prime Contractor by the Subcontractor or Suppliers will not relieve the prime Contractor of his obligation to the contract or his bid proposal.

H.10 Availability of Records

The Contracting Officer and other authorized Government officials shall have access to all records of the Contractor and subcontractors relating to personnel, payrolls, invoices of materials, and any and all other data relevant to the performance of the contract.

H.11 Final Inspection, Substantial Completion, and Acceptance of Completed Work

Final inspection will be made by the Contracting Officer when requested and when the Contractor advises that all the materials have been furnished, all the work has been performed, and all the construction provided for by the contract has been completed in accordance with its terms. The Contractor shall be ready for final inspection in order that necessary arrangements can be made. If a minor portion of the materials to be furnished or work to be done or construction provided for by the Contractor has not been completed at time of final inspection, the work under the contract may be determined to be substantially complete and the Contractor advised by the Contracting Officer in writing of the date on which the work is determined to be substantially complete. On the date when all materials, work, or other requirements of the drawings, specifications, and contract are furnished or completed, acceptance will be given by the Contracting Officer. The Contractor will be advised in writing of the date the work is determined to be completed and accepted, thereby relieving the Contractor of further responsibility for that unit of the work, and until such acceptance the Contractor will be responsible for all work performed and materials delivered as provided in FAR Clause 52.236-7, Permits and Responsibilities.

H.12 Tribal Taxes, Requirements and/or Restrictions

(a) Special attention is called to FAR Clause 52.236-7, Permits and Responsibilities and FAR Clause 52.229-3, Federal, State, and Local Taxes. (b) Contractor is responsible for contacting the Office of the Navajo Tax Commission and the Office of Navajo Labor relations for tribal taxes and Indian Preference employment information and the New Mexico Department of Revenue for current tax rate.

H.13 Bond Requirements

- (a) Performance Bond The amount of the performance bond shall be 100% of the original contract price.
- (b) Payment Bond The amount of the payment bond shall be 100% of the original contract price.
- (c) Individual Surety The bidders shall comply with FAR Clause 52.228-11, Pledges of Assets.
- (d) Third Party Indemnification Agreements. The prime contractor shall perform on the site with its own force work amounting to not less than fifteen (15%) (FAR Clause 52.236-01, Performance of Work by Contractor) of the total amount of the work, exclusive of the cost of materials, supplies and administration to the prime contractor. If during the progress of the work, the contractor requests, in writing a reduction in such percentage, and the Contracting Officer determines that a reduction would not be to the Government's disadvantage, the percentage of the work required to be performed by the contractor may be reduced; provided, prior written approval of the reduction is obtained by the Contractor from the Contracting Officer.
- (b) <u>Selection of Subcontractors</u>. Except as provided in DIAR Clause 1452.204-71, Indian Preference, the contractor and each subcontractor shall be free to select their subcontractors. Each subcontractor shall be capable of performing in a satisfactory manner, all work included in its subcontract. The contractor shall submit or require the submission of the following information to the Contracting Officer.
 - (1) The name and address of each subcontractor.
 - (2) A detailed description of the work covered by each subcontract.
- (3) A statement that the subcontractor has adequate resources and is capable of performing the work.
- (c) <u>Furnish Copies of Subcontracts</u>. No subcontractor will be allowed to perform any work on the project site until the conditions in (b) above have been met and the contractor has completed and submitted SF-1413, Statement and Acknowledgment, to the Contracting Officer in accordance with FAR Clause 52.222-11, Subcontracts (labor Standards). The subcontract shall include therein, verbatim, paragraphs b(1) through b(11) of FAR Clause 52.222-26, Equal Opportunity, incorporated by reference in this contract. These requirements pertain to all subcontracts, no matter what tier or

relationship they have to the prime contractor except that the FAR Clause 52.222-26, Equal Opportunity is not required to be included in subcontracts of \$10,000 or less.

(d) <u>Contractor's Responsibility for Subcontractors</u>. The contractor shall be responsible for the acts of all subcontractors and their employees when performing work at the project site, regardless of subcontractors' contractual relationship to the contractor. The contractor shall cause to be removed from the work at the project site any subcontractor or employee thereof whom the Contracting Officer, in writing, finds to be incompetent, careless, or otherwise objectionable. Failure of any subcontractor to complete the work described in its subcontract in a satisfactory manner, or without delay, will not excuse the contractor from any delay in the completion of the entire contract.

The Contracting Officer will ensure that minutes of the meetings are taken and copies provided to attendees.

If the adjudication is unfavorable, the credentials will be revoked. In the event of a disagreement between the Contractor and the Government concerning the suitability of an individual to perform work under this contract, DOI shall have the right of final determination.

This requirement must be incorporated into any subcontracts that require subcontractor personnel to have regular and routine unsupervised access to a Federally controlled facility for more than 180 calendar days or any unsupervised access to a Federally controlled Level 3 or 4 information system.

i.a clear description of the supplies or services required including quantities, specifications, and delivery schedules which facilitate the participation of Indian firms; ii.a statement indicating the preference will be given to Indian organizations and Indian-owned economic enterprises in accordance with Section 7(b) of Public Law 93-638; (88 Stat. 2205; 25 U.S.C. 450e(b)); iii.definitions for the terms "Indian organization" and "Indian-owned economic enterprise" as prescribed under the "Indian Preference -- Department of the Interior" clause of this contract; iv.a representation to be completed by the bidder or offeror that it is an Indian organization or Indian-owned economic enterprise; and

- (v) a closing date for receipt of bids or proposals which provides sufficient time for preparation and submission of a bid or proposal. If after soliciting bids from Indian organizations and Indian-owned economic enterprises, no responsible bid is received, the Contractor shall comply with the requirements of paragraph (d) of the "Indian Preference -- Department of the Interior" clause of this contract. - (6) The Contractor shall submit to the Contracting Officer for approval a semiannual report which summarizes the Contractor's Indian preference program and indicates (i) the number and types of available positions filled and dollar amounts of all subcontracts awarded to (a) Indian organizations and Indian-owned economic enterprises and (b) all other firms.
- (7) Records maintained pursuant to this clause will be kept available for review by the Government until expiration of one (1) year after final payment under this contract, or for such longer period as may be required by any other clause of this contract or by applicable law or regulation.

- (c) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. The Contracting Officer will withhold from payments due under the contract sufficient funds required to satisfy any Contractor or subcontractor liabilities for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. If amounts withheld under the contract are insufficient to satisfy Contractor or subcontractor liabilities, the Contracting Officer will withhold payments from other Federal or Federally assisted contracts held by the same Contractor that are subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards statute.
- (d) Payrolls and basic records.
 - (1) The Contractor and its subcontractors shall maintain payrolls and basic payroll records for all laborers and mechanics working on the contract during the contract and shall make them available to the Government until 3 years after contract completion. The records shall contain the name and address of each employee, social security number, labor classifications, hourly rates of wages paid, daily and weekly number of hours worked, deductions made, and actual wages paid. The records need not duplicate those required for construction work by Department of Labor regulations at 29 CFR 5.5(a)(3) implementing the Construction Wage Rate Requirements statute.
 - (2) The Contractor and its subcontractors shall allow authorized representatives of the Contracting Officer or the Department of Labor to inspect, copy, or transcribe records maintained under paragraph (d)(1) of this clause. The Contractor or subcontractor also shall allow authorized representatives of the Contracting Officer or Department of Labor to interview employees in the workplace during working hours.
- (e) Subcontracts. The Contractor shall insert the provisions set forth in paragraphs (a) through (d) of this clause in subcontracts may require or involve the employment of laborers and mechanics and require subcontractors to include these provisions in any such lower-tier subcontracts. The Contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower-tier subcontractor with the provisions set forth in paragraphs (a) through (d) of this clause.

Such permanent, previously established facilities are not a part of the "site of the work" even if the operations for a period of time may be dedicated exclusively or nearly so, to the performance of a contract.

- (1) All laborers and mechanics employed or working upon the site of the work will be paid unconditionally and not less often than once a week, and without subsequent deduction or rebate on any account (except such payroll deductions as are permitted by regulations issued by the Secretary of Labor under the Copeland Act (29 CFR Part 3)), the full amount of wages and bona fide fringe benefits (or cash equivalents thereof) due at time of payment computed at rates not less than those contained in the wage determination of the Secretary of Labor which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, or as may be incorporated for a secondary site of the work, regardless of any contractual relationship which may be alleged to exist between the Contractor and such laborers and mechanics. Any wage determination incorporated for a secondary site of the work shall be effective from the first day on which work under the contract was performed at that site and shall be incorporated without any adjustment in contract price or estimated cost. Laborers employed by the construction Contractor or construction subcontractor that are transporting portions of the building or work between the secondary site of the work and the primary site of the work shall be paid in accordance with the wage determination applicable to the primary site of the work.
- (2) Contributions made or costs reasonably anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits under section 1(b)(2) of the Construction Wage Rate Requirements statute on behalf of laborers or mechanics are

considered wages paid to such laborers or mechanics, subject to the provisions of paragraph (e) of this clause; also, regular contributions made or costs incurred for more than a weekly period (but not less often than quarterly) under plans, funds, or programs which cover the particular weekly period, are deemed to be constructively made or incurred during such period.

- (3) Such laborers and mechanics shall be paid not less than the appropriate wage rate and fringe benefits in the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed, without regard to skill, except as provided in the clause entitled Apprentices and Trainees. Laborers or mechanics performing work in more than one classification may be compensated at the rate specified for each classification for the time actually worked therein; provided, that the employer's payroll records accurately set forth the time spent in each classification in which work is performed.
- (4) The wage determination (including any additional classifications and wage rates conformed under paragraph (c) of this clause) and the Construction Wage Rate Requirements (Davis-Bacon Act) poster (WH-1321) shall be posted at all times by the Contractor and its subcontractors at the site of the work in a prominent and accessible place where it can be easily seen by the workers.

(c)

- (1) The Contracting Officer shall require that any class of laborers or mechanics which is not listed in the wage determination and which is to be employed under the contract shall be classified in conformance with the wage determination. The Contracting Officer shall approve an additional classification and wage rate and fringe benefits therefor only when all the following criteria have been met:
 - (i) The work to be performed by the classification requested is not performed by a classification in the wage determination.
 - (ii) The classification is utilized in the area by the construction industry.
 - (iii) The proposed wage rate, including any bona fide fringe benefits, bears a reasonable relationship to the wage rates contained in the wage determination.
- (2) If the Contractor and the laborers and mechanics to be employed in the classification (if known), or their representatives, and the Contracting Officer agree on the classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits, where appropriate), a report of the action taken shall be sent by the Contracting Officer to the Administrator of the:

Wage and Hour Division Employment Standards Administration U.S. Department of Labor Washington, DC 20210

The Administrator or an authorized representative will approve, modify, or disapprove every additional classification action within 30 days of receipt and so advise the Contracting Officer or will notify the Contracting Officer within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary.

(3) In the event the Contractor, the laborers or mechanics to be employed in the classification, or their representatives, and the Contracting Officer do not agree on the proposed classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits, where appropriate), the Contracting Officer shall refer the questions, including the views of all interested parties and the recommendation of the Contracting Officer, to the Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division for determination. The Administrator, or an authorized representative, will issue a determination within 30 days of receipt and

so advise the Contracting Officer or will notify the Contracting Officer within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary.

- (4) The wage rate (including fringe benefits, where appropriate) determined pursuant to subparagraphs (c)(2) and (c)(3) of this clause shall be paid to all workers performing work in the classification under this contract from the first day on which work is performed in the classification.
- (d) Whenever the minimum wage rate prescribed in the contract for a class of laborers or mechanics includes a fringe benefit which is not expressed as an hourly rate, the Contractor shall either pay the benefit as stated in the wage determination or shall pay another bona fide fringe benefit or an hourly cash equivalent thereof.
- (e) If the Contractor does not make payments to a trustee or other third person, the Contractor may consider as part of the wages of any laborer or mechanic the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing bona fide fringe benefits under a plan or program; provided, That the Secretary of Labor has found, upon the written request of the Contractor, that the applicable standards of the Construction Wage Rate Requirements statute have been met. The Secretary of Labor may require the Contractor to set aside in a separate account assets for the meeting of obligations under the plan or program.

1.09 52.222-07 WITHHOLDING OF FUNDS

MAY 2014

The Contracting Officer shall, upon his or her own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor, withhold or cause to be withheld from the Contractor under this contract or any other Federal contract with the same Prime Contractor, or any other federally assisted contract subject to prevailing wage requirements, which is held by the same Prime Contractor, so much of the accrued payments or advances as may be considered necessary to pay laborers and mechanics, including apprentices, trainees, and helpers, employed by the Contractor or any subcontractor the full amount of wages required by the contract. In the event of failure to pay any laborer or mechanic, including any apprentice, trainee, or helper, employed or working on the site of the work, all or part of the wages required by the contract, the Contracting Officer may, after written notice to the Contractor, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance, or guarantee of funds until such violations have ceased.

Such records shall contain the name, address, and social security number of each such worker, his or her correct classification, hourly rates of wages paid (including rates of contributions or costs anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits or cash equivalents thereof of the types described in 40 U.S.C. 3141(2)(B) (Construction Wage Rate Requirement statute)), daily and weekly number of hours worked, deductions made, and actual wages paid. Whenever the Secretary of Labor has found, under paragraph (d) of the clause entitled Construction Wage Rate Requirements, that the wages of any laborer or mechanic include the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing benefits under a plan or program described in 40 U.S.C. 3141(2)(B), the Contractor shall maintain records which show that the commitment to provide such benefits is enforceable, that the plan or program is financially responsible, and that the plan or program has been communicated in writing to the laborers or mechanics affected, and records which show the costs anticipated or the actual cost incurred in

- (1) The Contractor shall submit weekly for each week in which any contract work is performed a copy of all payrolls to the Contracting Officer. The Prime Contractor is responsible for the submission of copies of payrolls by all subcontractors, Contractors and subcontractors shall maintain the full social security number and current address of each covered worker, and shall provide them upon request to the Contracting Officer, the Contractor, or the Wage and Hour Division of the Department of Labor for purposes of an investigation or audit of compliance with prevailing wage requirements. It is not a violation of this section for a Prime Contractor to require a subcontractor to provide addresses and social security numbers to the Prime Contractor for its own records, without weekly submission to the Contracting Officer.
- (2) Each payroll submitted shall be accompanied by a "Statement of Compliance," signed by the Contractor or subcontractor or his or her agent who pays or supervises the payment of the persons employed under the contract and shall certify --
 - (i) That the payroll for the payroll period contains the information required to be maintained under paragraph (a) of this clause and that such information is correct and complete;
 - (ii) That each laborer or mechanic (including each helper, apprentice, and trainee) employed on the contract during the payroll period has been paid the full weekly wages earned, without rebate, either directly or indirectly, and that no deductions have been made either directly or indirectly from the full wages earned, other than permissible deductions as set forth in the Regulations, 29 CFR Part 3; and
 - (iii) That each laborer or mechanic has been paid not less than the applicable wage rates and fringe benefits or cash equivalents for the classification of work performed, as specified in the applicable wage determination incorporated into the contract.
- (3) The weekly submission of a properly executed certification set forth on the reverse side of Optional Form WH-347 shall satisfy the requirement for submission of the "Statement of Compliance" required by subparagraph (b)(2) of this clause.
- (4) The falsification of any of the certifications in this clause may subject the Contractor or subcontractor to civil or criminal prosecution under Section 1001 of Title 18 and Section 3729 of Title 31 of the United States Code.
- (c) The Contractor or subcontractor shall make the records required under paragraph (a) of this clause available for inspection, copying, or transcription by the Contracting Officer or authorized representatives of the Contracting Officer or the Department of Labor. The Contractor or subcontractor shall permit the Contracting Officer or representatives of the Contracting Officer or the Department of Labor to interview employees during working hours on the job. If the Contractor or subcontractor fails to submit required records or to make them

 - (2) Does not include bulk cargo, as defined in 46 U.S.C. 40102(4), such as agricultural products and petroleum products.
- "Component" means an article, material, or supply incorporated directly into a construction material.
- "Construction material" means an article, material, or supply brought to the construction site by the Contractor or subcontractor for incorporation into the building or work. The term also includes an item brought to the site preassembled from articles, materials, or supplies. However, emergency life safety systems, such as emergency lighting, fire alarm, and audio evacuation systems, that are discrete systems incorporated into a public building or work and that are produced as complete systems, are evaluated as a single and distinct construction material regardless of when or how the individual parts or components of those systems are delivered to the construction site. Materials purchased directly by the Government are supplies, not construction material.

"Cost of components" means--

(1) For components purchased by the Contractor, the acquisition cost, including transportation costs to the place of incorporation into the construction material (whether or not such costs are paid to a domestic firm), and any applicable duty (whether or not a duty-free entry certificate is issued); or

- (2) A Free Trade Agreement country (Australia, Bahrain, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Korea (Republic of), Mexico, Morocco, Nicaragua, Oman, Panama, Peru, or Singapore);
- (3) A least developed country (Afghanistan, Angola, Bangladesh, Benin, Bhutan, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cambodia Central African Republic, Chad, Comoros, Democratic Republic of Congo, Djibouti, Equatorial Guinea, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Gambia, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Haiti, Kiribati, Laos, Lesotho, Liberia, Madagascar, Malawi, Mali, Mauritania, Mozambique, Nepal, Niger, Rwanda, Samoa, Sao Tome and Principe, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Solomon Islands, Somalia, South Sudan, Tanzania, Timor-Leste, Togo, Tuvalu, Uganda, Vanuatu, Yemen, or Zambia); or
- (4) A Caribbean Basin country (Antigua and Barbuda, Aruba, Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Bonaire, British Virgin Islands, Curacao, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, Montserrat, Saba, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Sint Eustatius, Sint Maarten, or Trinidad and Tobago).

"Designated country construction material" means a construction material that is a WTO GPA country construction material, a least developed country construction material, or a Caribbean Basin country construction material.

"Domestic construction material" means-

- (1) An unmanufactured construction material mined or produced in the United States;
- (2) A construction material manufactured in the United States, if-
 - (i) The cost of its components mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States exceeds 50 percent of the cost of all its components. Components of foreign origin of the same class or kind for which nonavailability determinations have been made are treated as domestic: or



SECTION M -- EVALUATION FACTORS FOR AWARD

M.1 SECTION M - EVALUATION FACTORS FOR AWARD

- 1.0 Introduction: This section outlines the criteria the Government will use in evaluating the offeror's capabilities and proposal. The Government will compare each offeror's capabilities and proposal elements against predetermined measures of merit related to the Government's requirement defined herein.
- 2.0. General Basis for Award: This is a competitive, best value, source selection that will be conducted in accordance with Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR Part 15.3). In using this best value approach, the Government seeks to award to an offeror who gives the BIA the greatest confidence that it will best meet our requirements affordably. To arrive at a source selection decision, the Source Selection Authority (SSA) will integrate the source selection team's assessment of the evaluation factors (described below). While the Government evaluation team will strive for maximum objectivity, the source selection process by its nature is subjective and therefore professional judgment is implicit throughout the entire process. This may result in an award being made to a higher rated, higher priced offeror where the decision is consistent with the evaluation factors and the SSA reasonably determines that the technical superiority, and/or overall business approach, and/or superior past performance, of the higher priced offeror outweighs the cost difference.
- 3.0 Competitive range: The Government reserves the right to limit for purposes of efficiency, the number of proposals in the competitive range to the greatest number that will permit an efficient competition among the most highly rated proposals. If the contracting officer, decides that an offeror's proposal should no longer be included in the competitive range, the proposal shall be eliminated from consideration for award and written notice of the decision shall be provided to the unsuccessful offeror in accordance with FAR 15.503.
- 3.1. Discussions: To maximize the Government's ability to obtain best value, based on the requirement and the evaluation factors set forth in this RFP, it may be necessary to conduct discussions. If discussions are necessary due to perceived weaknesses or other issues, which must be addressed before award, they will be conducted with only those offerors determined to be within the competitive range. Discussions may be conducted either orally or in writing. The scope and extent of discussions are a matter of contracting officer judgment. The Government may make a final determination as to whether the offeror's proposal is acceptable or unacceptable solely on the basis of the initial proposal as submitted. Accordingly, offerors are advised to submit initial proposals which are full and clearly acceptable and without the need for additional information. Offerors may be restricted to a short turnaround (i.e., less than 24 hours) in responding to the contracting officer during any discussion period.
- 3.2. Final Proposal Revisions: If discussions are conducted, final proposal revisions will be required in determining the award of the contract resulting from this RFP. However, the Government reserves the right to award a contract without discussions or opportunity for proposal revisions, in which case, final proposal revisions will not be required. Offerors are advised that unsupported final proposal revisions may be penalized in the overall proposal evaluation, and an otherwise acceptable proposal could be placed in jeopardy.
- 3.3 Rejection of Unrealistic Offers: The Government may reject any proposal that is evaluated to be unrealistic on contract terms and conditions, or unrealistically high or low in price when compared to Government estimates, such that the proposal is deemed to reflect an inherent lack of competence or failure to comprehend the complexity and risks of the technical requirements.
- 3.4 Correction Potential of Proposals: The Government will consider throughout the evaluation, the "correction potential" of any deficiency or proposal inadequacy. The judgment of such "correction potential" is within the sole discretion of the Government. If an aspect of an offeror's proposal not meeting the Government's requirements is not considered correctable, the offeror may be eliminated from the competitive range. For a proposal to result in an awardable contract, the proposal must at least meet all technical

requirements, conform to all required terms and conditions, and include all required certifications. Offerors are required to meet RFP requirements in addition to those identified as evaluation criteria to be eligible for award.

4.0 Contract Award: Award will be made to the Offeror: (1) whose proposal is technically acceptable and (2) whose technical/cost relationship is the "best value" to the Government. While price is secondary to technical factors, it is an important element in the award decision. This means that award may not necessarily be made to the Offeror submitting the lowest proposed price nor to an Offeror proposing technical advantages that would appear to exceed those needed for successful performance of the work. All evaluation factors other than cost or price, when combined, are significantly more important than cost or price. Factor 2 - Management Control (30 points):

- 1. Each Offeror shall submit a plan consisting of a narrative explanation of their proposed on-site approach to project management and coordination, including cost control measures on contract modifications and how they are tracked.
- 2. Each Offeror will be required to provide the relevant experience and knowledge of key individual(s) of the construction team who will be assigned directly to the project. One of the key individuals is the Project Superintendent, who must have at least 5 years of direct work experience in Heavy Dam construction. The Project Superintendent must have successfully completed at least five (5) projects with a similar or more complex scope for at least eighty (80%) percent of the total project term, in the project superintendent position.
